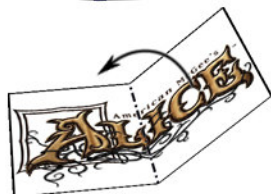
Alice has changed as well. She has grown older. And insane.

But whether or not it is a good thing when the White Rabbit comes to take her back to Wonderland, and it turns out Alice isn't insane after all...? (is she..?)

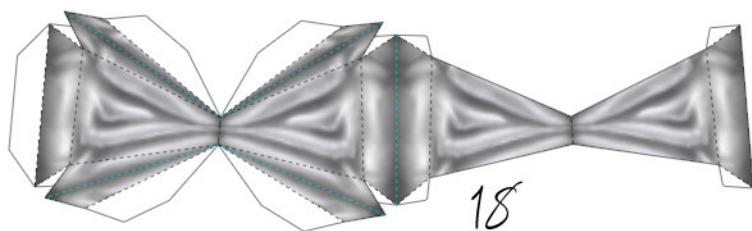
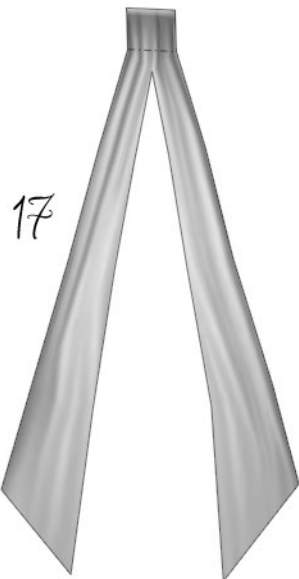
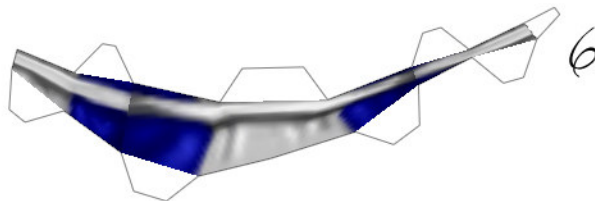
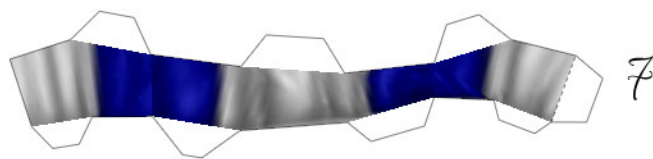
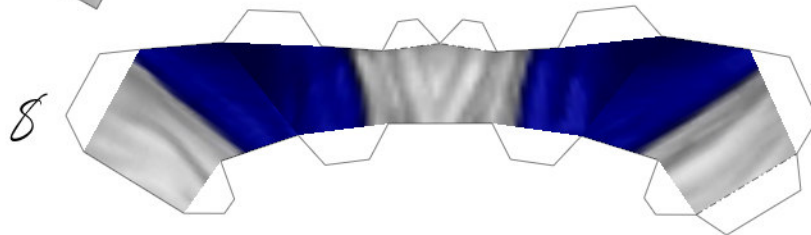
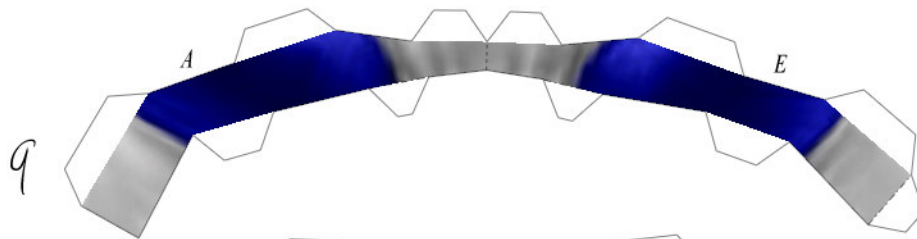
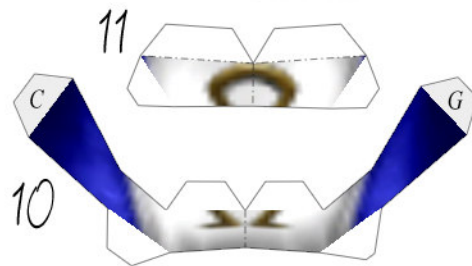
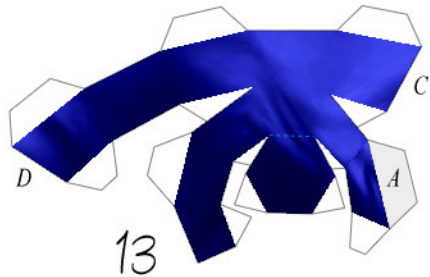
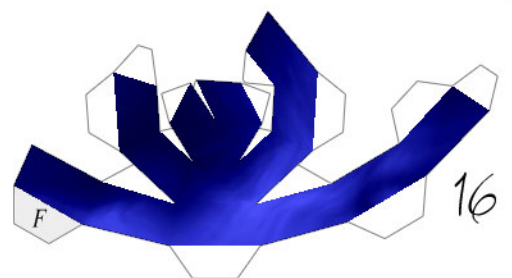
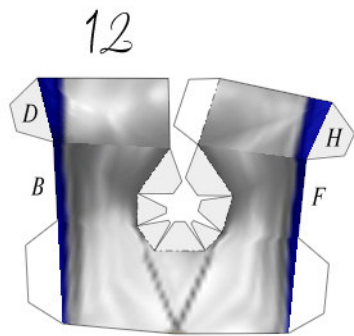
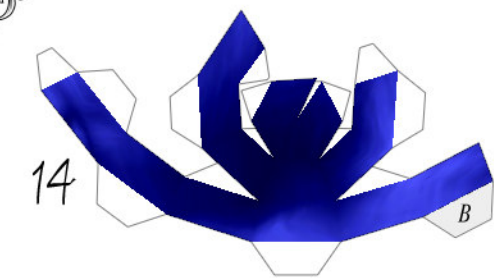


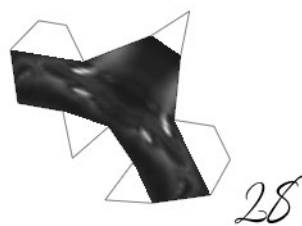
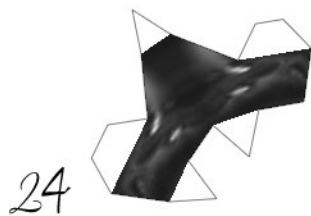
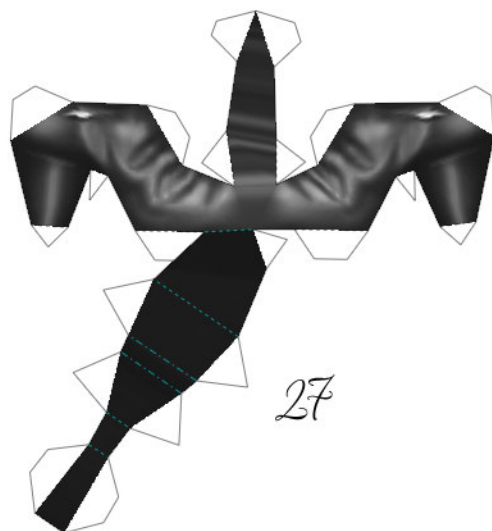
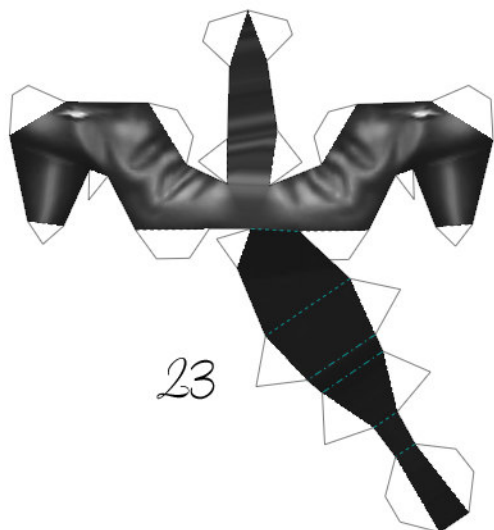
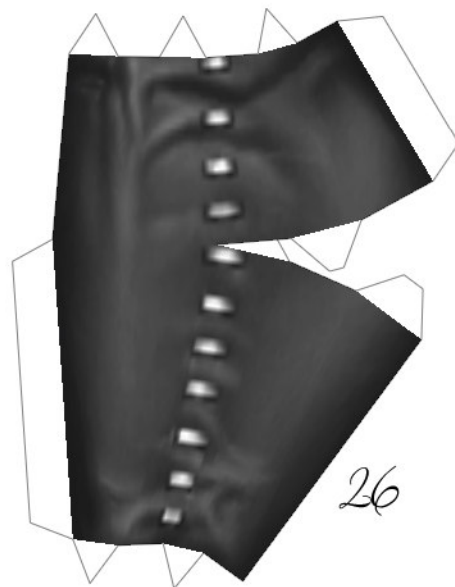
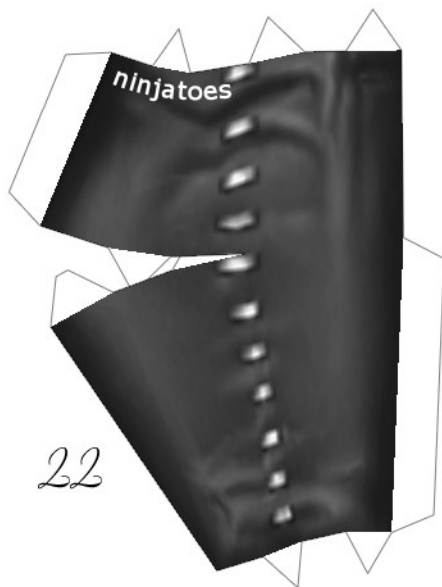
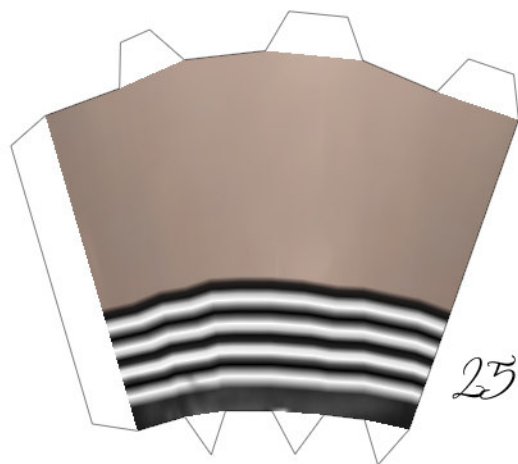

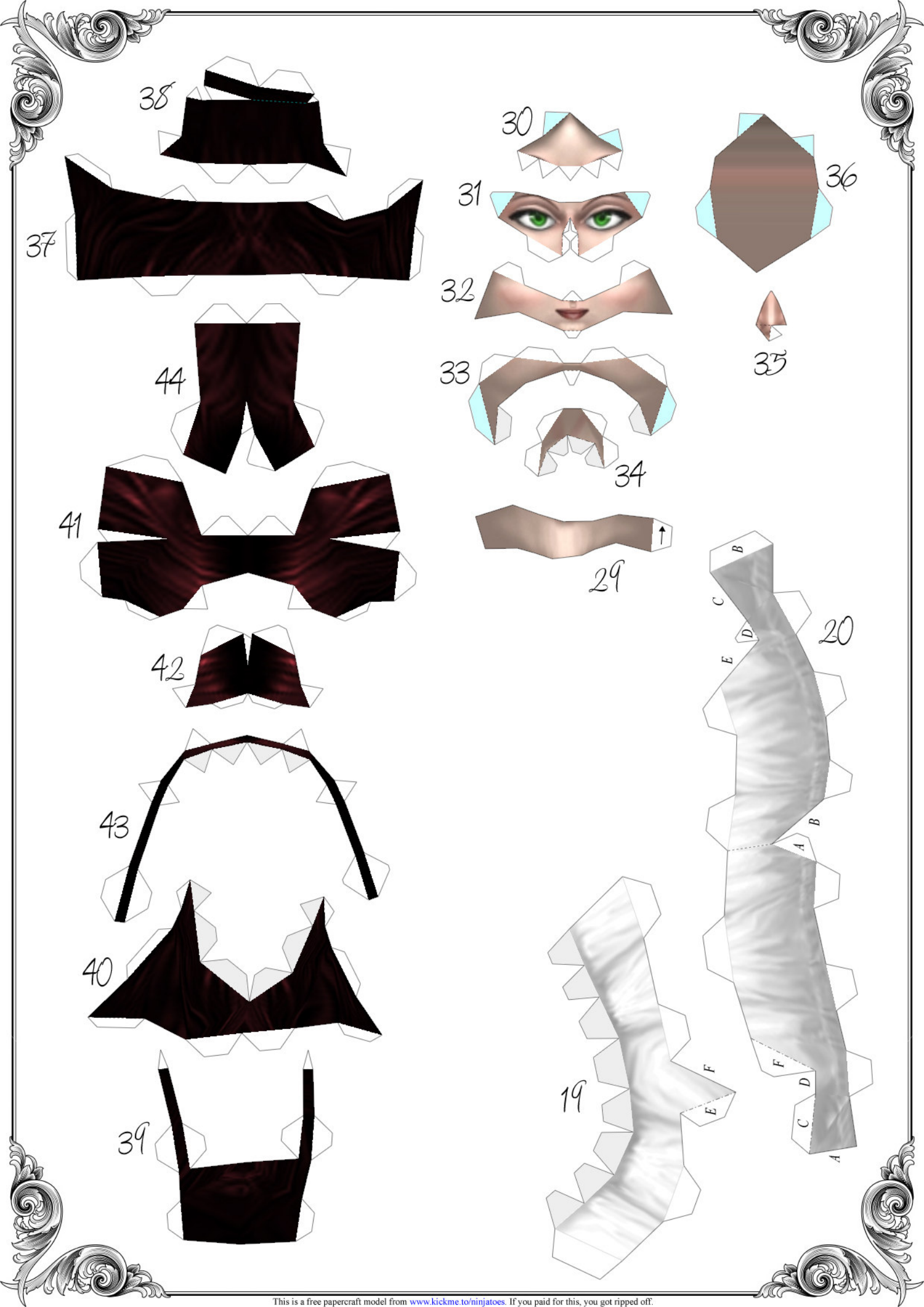


dashed lines:
